The renovation and restoration of the Bathurst Rail Museum (BRM) has created a world class facility that interprets the social history of the development of rail for Bathurst and regional NSW through the stories of everyday people. The museum includes a large train layout the size of a tennis court, and a Kids Central learning area, both of which have been created in the two recent architecturally designed extensions.

Outcomes

Replicability/Leadership

The project is an example of creating a world class museum in a regional setting and demonstrating leadership through using local people to convey local stories. The project also created spaces for children to encourage local families to visit regularly.



Budget

The Bathurst Railway Musuem is a \$5.4 million project with \$4 million contributed from Council and the other funding sourced from state and federal government.



Innovation

The project includes adaptive re-use of an historic building. The building was used pre-1915 as a place of education and recreation for railway workers and their families. Traditionally rail museums focused on the technical elements of railways through objects. Bathurst Railway Museum has turned its focus to the people and their stories. The aim of the museum is to engage audiences of all ages and includes a café to attract locals.

Measurable Cultural Outcomes

The Bathurst Railway Museam has created a sense of belonging to shared cultural heritage by using local stories about the development of the rail line. A Local Stories Cabinet has also been developed, encouraging families to curate their rail history through objects and images. Education is also a primary outcome and education tours have been developed to cater for children of all ages.
